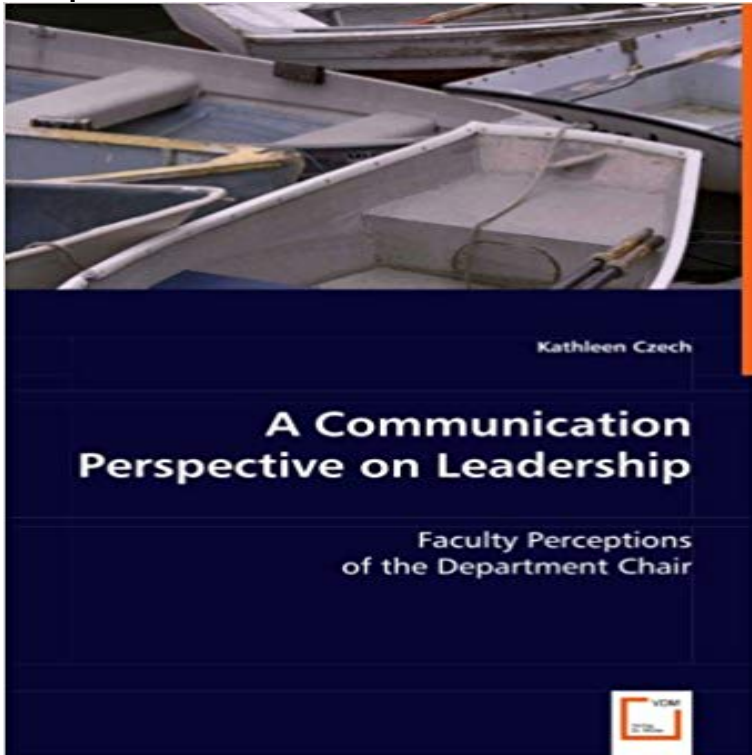


A Communication Perspective on Leadership: Faculty Perceptions of the Department Chair
