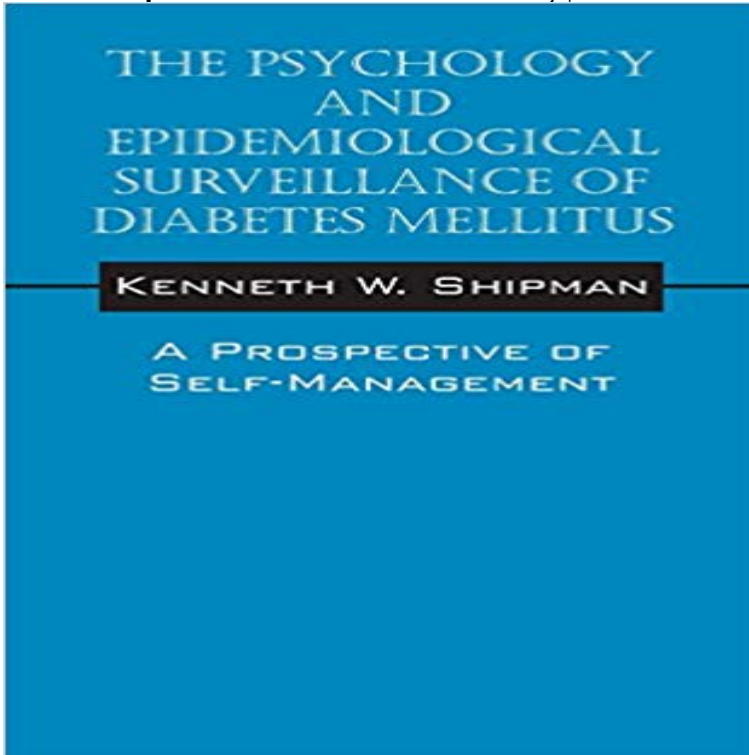


The Psychology and Epidemiological Surveillance of Diabetes Mellitus: A Prospective of Self-Management
